# Our Organization

We are a mission-oriented PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly) organization devoted to promoting independence and dignity for frail seniors



myPlace Health was founded in 2021 by mission-driven healthcare leaders and organizations, **including SCAN Group** and **Commonwealth Care Alliance (CCA)**, that are committed to drastically improving health outcomes, quality and experience for vulnerable older adults and frail seniors.

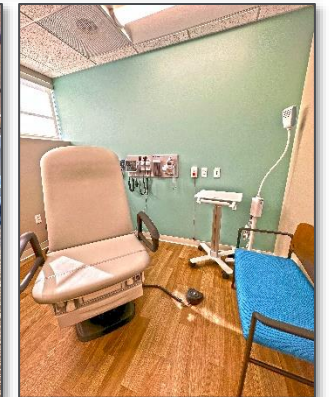
myPlace Health is an integrated care delivery organization that specializes in providing personalized care and coverage to older adults who wish to remain safely living in their homes and communities for as long as possible, rather than living in a nursing facility.

**Our mission is simple: to enable older adults to live the independent lives they deserve.** The primary ways in which we pursue our mission are through capitated arrangements with government payers, such as Medicare and Medicaid under the PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly) model, and as a value-based provider working in partnership with local health plans.



# We launched our flagship Care Center in January in Los Angeles, transforming a 30,000 sq. ft. dental office into a “home away from home” for older Angelenos

*Our first Care Center is located in the heart of Los Angeles, serving eligible older adults across 95 zip codes in Los Angeles County*



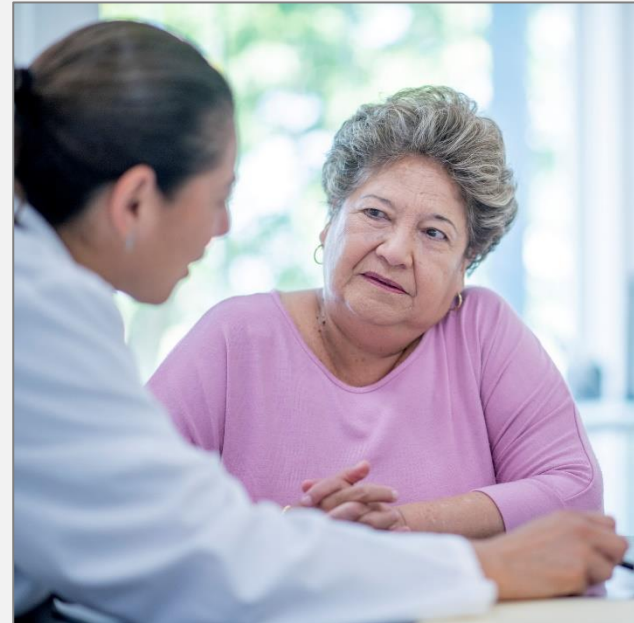
*We will be launching our second Care Center in Southern Los Angeles County in July 2025, with a service area of 60 zip codes*

### Participant Profile

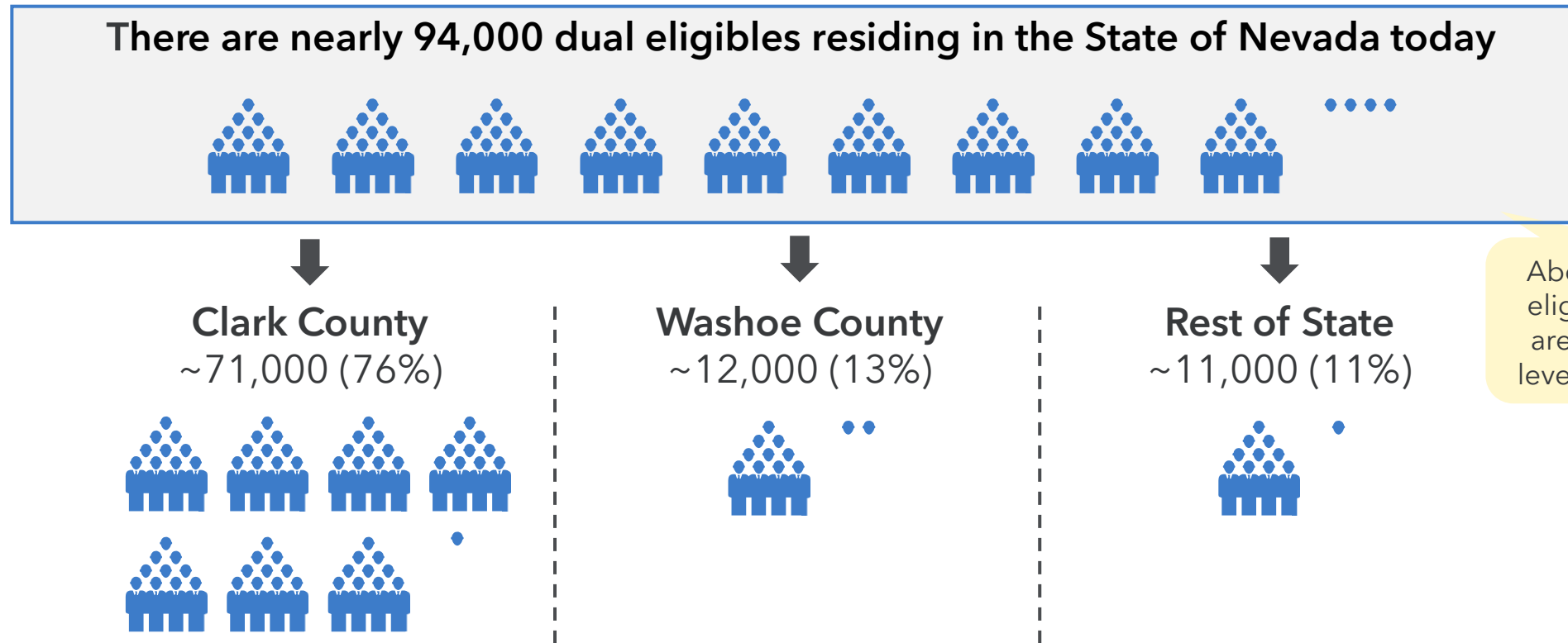
- Age: mid-70s

# The State of Aging in Nevada

# The State of Nevada's dually eligible population is large, growing, and primarily concentrated in urban areas



The dual eligible population in Nevada has grown 3.8% since 2018 and will continue to rise, accelerating the need for high-quality integrated care models that can effectively serve these complex older adults

# Further, the state's current Long Term Services and Supports (LTSS) infrastructure faces significant challenges

## Existing Issues within Nevada's LTSS Landscape

### Limited HCBS Waiver Program Access & Spending

- Frail Elderly (FE) and Physically Disabled (PD) HCBS waiver programs in Nevada have waiting lists and are not readily available to all who need waived services
- For older adults and individuals with physical disabilities, only 34% of Nevada's LTSS spending went to HCBS - **19% lower than national LTSS spending**

**89%** of FE and... *Budgeted caseloads were used, however, both*  
**88%** of PD *programs have waiting lists*

*Health Management Associates Nevada Medicaid ABD Assessment Findings (2024): Nevada's MAABD Population*

### Inadequate Nursing Home Quality & Access

- According to the AARP 2023 LTSS State Scorecard, Nevada ranked:
  - **43<sup>rd</sup> out of 51** for Nursing Home Hospital Admissions
  - **43<sup>rd</sup> out of 51** for Nursing Homes with Top Quality Ratings
  - **41<sup>st</sup> out of 51** for Nursing Home Residents with Pressure Sores
- Further, access to nursing facilities in Nevada is becoming increasingly limited
  - To meet projected population growth by 2030, the average nursing home in Nevada would need to add 40 beds - **twice the national average**
  - Even today, low bed supply has led Nevadans to accept out-of-state nursing facility placements to receive the level of care they need, increasing state healthcare expenditures by sending residents to Arizona, Utah, Idaho, and Massachusetts
