Nevada Early Intervention Services-Reno office DATA collection

September 13, 2018: Met NEIS staffs: Development specialist and SLP with deaf and hard of hearing children. These NEIS staffs received Sky Hi trainings several years ago. The following datas are:

SKI-HI Language Development (LDS) 2nd edition "Assessment of Language Skills For Children Who Are Deaf or Hard of Hearing from infancy to Five Years of Age". Test form (Individual Test Booklet) SKI-HI Institute Utah State University Logan, They use the LDS-Language Development Scale. Almost every child has a LDS. This is the major tool we use to track the development of language. **NOTE: a copy** of three pages of the SKI HI booklet "**The Gestural Approach to Thought and Expression" (G.A.T.E.)**: Depending on the cognitive level of the child and if they have other deficits and look at non-verbal, gesture communication from 0 months to 36 months. It gives total communication age in months, which reflects the infant or child's non-verbal gestural communication level. It includes sign language, as the child gets older or more mature in their communication.

"Callier-Azusa Scale" It covers all areas of development, the original scale is called Scale "G" which can be obtained through the University of Texas, Callier Center for Communication Disorders. Scale "H" is a specific component that is based on the work of Dr. Jan van Dijk and is authored by Robert Stillman and Christy Battle. Specifically a Communication Scale (Scale H) that looks at multi-challenged children with hearing loss and other conditions. Another multi-handicapped scale they have rarely utilized, is the CAROLINA which covers 5 areas of development.

Rossetti Infant Toddler Language Scale compares children with hearing and is used, but cautiously. For eligibility something called the DASI-2 is used.

December 8, 2018: 1. Attended Lead-K meeting. The blue folders passed out to the members, It includes Model Legislation for States (7 pages), Lead-K State Checklist, Immediate release-two letters-AG Bell statement on Lead-K Agreement, draft-Lead-K of Nevada's mission, reports from 1965 to 1994 showing that the education for deaf is not working. Lead-K data collection—numbers of deaf students, interpreters in Las Vegas, Advocacy tips for meeting with legislators.2. Diane Miller, AuD. Doctor mentioned that NV EHDI Program and the early intervention services in Nevada is working Paula Pittman from the SKI Hi Institute to ensure quality early intervention services in Nevada.

3. Tessa Pearce attended Lead-K summit last October mentioned that NV encourage certified deaf mentors but no training. The cost of the SKI Hi training is about \$7,000 and three days of training. 4.
