WHO WE ARE:

The Aging & Disability Services Division (ADSD) provides resources at the community level which promote equal opportunity and life choices for people with disabilities through which they may positively contribute to Nevada. Within the ADSD there are:

ADSD offices are located in: Carson City, Reno, Elko and Las Vegas.

WHAT WE DO:

Each Services unit provides administrative and policy oversight as well as working with a variety of community partners to meet the needs of all eligible Nevadans across the lifespan. Private/public sector partnerships are central to effective service delivery, programmatic success and community integration for people with disabilities; therefore, ADSD partners with several Boards, Councils, and Commissions. WHO WE ARE:



Early Intervention Services

Nevada Early Intervention Services is a statewide program that provides early intervention services to children birth- 3 years of age with developmental delays and disabilities. We serve approximately 3,000 children on any given day. We fall under the federal program and rules of IDEA, Part C. Our main site locations are in Carson City, Reno, Elko, and Las Vegas. In addition, specialty clinics and programs include: Genetics, Craniofacial, Metabolic, Autism Diagnostics, Screening and Monitoring program, and CAPTA. We believe that the best start is an early start!

Eligibility- Nevada's definition of developmentally delayed for early intervention 0-3 years:

- * 25% delay in two areas of development, or
- * 50% delay in one area of development, or
- * A diagnosed physical or mental condition which has a high probability of a developmental delay.

WHAT WE DO:

We believe that families are an integral part of the team for decision making and intervention. We provide services during the family's normal daily routines and in the natural environment so the child has on-going opportunities to practice their skills. Our services are at no out of pocket cost to the family. We believe in the trans-disciplinary process, and provide services using the primary service provider model. Early intervention supports the concept of the public-private partnerships, and we contract with various private entities to provide EI services. NOTICE:

A letter from Michael Willden, Administrator for the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), was recently sent out to let staff know about the consolidation of the three Divisions. As he states: "The alignment of DHHS programs providing care across the life span will enhance Nevada's efforts to create a system that is accessible, flexible and sustainable." He goes on to state that he is "counting on your support as we move forward with this important initiative."

Developmental Services agencies

WHO WE ARE:

Developmental Services Regional Centers provide supports and services to approximately 6000 children and adults in Nevada throughout their life span. To be eligible for services, the applicant must have a documented diagnosis of intellectual disability or a closely related condition such as Cerebral Palsy, Epilepsy, Autism, or other neurological impairment that is a developmental disability occurring prior to age 22 years. In addition, the person must have substantial limitations in adaptive functioning.

There are three Regional Centers:

- Desert Regional Center, serving individuals in Clark, Nye and Lincoln Counties;
- Sierra Regional Center, providing services in Washoe County; and
- Rural Regional Center, serving the 17 rural Nevada counties.

WHAT WE DO:

The Regional Centers provide support services that individuals need to assist them in becoming more independent and achieve a greater quality of life. All eligible individuals receive Service Coordination and other services based upon their wants, needs and eligibility. Regional Centers also contract with a variety of community providers who assist individuals to live and work in their communities.
