These one-time services provide adaptive equipment, technology, vehicle modifications, and home modifications and repairs. <i>May Status Update:</i> Will be issuing supplemental funding to the Assistive Technology for Independent Living partner, after funding decisions have been made for SFY2024. The 4M model focuses on: What Matters to Older Adults, Medication Management, Mentation (depression/dementia/delirium), and Mobility (fall prevention, pain management, etc.). Disability Services	Specialized Children's Services	ADSD is seeking ARPA funding to hire a consultant to assist with development of a competitive request for proposal for Intensive Behavioral Support homes for individuals with dual diagnoses of intellectual/developmental disability (IDD) and behavioral health needs. The use of a consultant will bring in an expert level of knowledge and best practices to ensure the agency is recruiting a provider with the right skills and service model to serve this population. The consultant would also augment ADSD staff on working with Medicaid and CMS to identify any changes to the current Medicaid IDD waiver. The primary focus of this work will be the behavioral health crisis and the lack of service providers available to serve children and adults with IDD with co-occurring behavioral health needs.	\$14,520,000

Multiple	Enhancing Health Literacy for Seniors and People with Disabilities and their Families	ADSD will contract with a vendor to do full website redesign of the ADSD website.
