Survey Status:

The survey has already been created and approved by the full Commission. The platform to host it is available through ADSD (Aging and Disability Services Division).

University Partnership:

There is a plan to partner with Nevada State University (NSU) students to:

- Interpret survey questions into American Sign Language (ASL).
- · Possibly assist with interpreting results later.
- Dr. Kelsey from NSU is willing to help coordinate this.

ASL Interpretation Details:

- Each question will be signed in ASL without including question numbers (to allow flexibility in reordering).
- Captions are not required since the English text will be visible.
- Responses will be selected in English after the ASL interpretation.
- Optional: Participants can record comments, but the survey will primarily use multiple-choice questions.
- Deaf professionals will monitor the accuracy of the ASL videos.

Technical Setup:

- The survey will be hosted using ADSD's platform.
- Videos will be uploaded to the form.
- Once content is ready, there should be no delay in launching, as all approvals are already in place.

Next Steps:

- A concrete action plan is needed within the next 2–3 weeks to launch the survey during the fall semester while students are still in school.
- Dissemination will include:

- Posting on the Commission's website.
- Creating a QR code and flyers.
- Sharing through existing listservs and at the upcoming conference (focused on K–12 education accessibility).

• Timeline Consideration:

- The survey could remain open through December, but this depends on the workload of those reviewing and processing the data.

Deaf School Study - Legislative and Strategic Update

Background:

- A proposal to conduct a legislative study on establishing a deaf school in Nevada was included in a broader omnibus bill introduced by Assemblywoman Tracy Brown-May.
- This idea had previously been introduced by Senator Spearman in an earlier session but did not pass.
- The recent bill also failed, largely due to:
 - Being bundled with multiple unrelated priorities.
 - A growing fiscal note (cost estimate) tied to hiring a panel and conducting formal studies.

Current Status:

- The idea of a deaf school study is not currently moving forward legislatively.
- The subcommittee is now considering alternative, community-driven approaches to keep the idea alive for the next legislative session.

Proposed Path Forward:

• Return to the original plan: Partner with community allies or organizations (e.g., DD Council) to conduct an independent study.

- Use the upcoming survey as a first step to gather relevant data.
- Consider hosting town halls, community panels, and focus groups to collect both quantitative and qualitative data.
- Compile findings into a report that outlines:
 - Community needs.
 - Implications of the data.
 - Recommendations for legislative action.

Key Points from Dr. Felicia Rutledge:

- Emphasized the importance of community voices, especially those closest to the challenges (e.g., families, teachers of the deaf).
- Suggested including teachers of the deaf, even from out of state, due to Nevada's shortage.
- Recommended combining survey data, town hall feedback, and panel discussions to create a comprehensive, human-centered report.
- This report could then be used to reignite legislative interest with stronger, communitybacked evidence.
- 6. **For Discussion and Possible Action:** Discussion and possible vote to approve a Follow up Letter and/or Requested Discussion with Department of Education on the perceived non-existent elements of the Lead-K law and practices in Nevada. Action to be presented to the General Commission for final approvals following this meeting.

Lead-K Law Compliance & Department of Education Outreach - Summary

Background:

- The subcommittee noted a lack of recent engagement from the Nevada Department of Education (NDE) regarding their obligations under the Lead-K law, which was passed several years ago.
- The law required NDE to:
 - Convene a committee (which they did).
 - Develop guidelines for educators and resources for parents on language acquisition benchmarks for children up to age 6.
 - Assess and report on children's language development using those benchmarks.

- While a committee was formed and a report was created, no further action (e.g., guideline creation, assessments, or public reporting) has been taken by NDE.
- Currently, only Nevada Early Intervention Services (NEIS) collects limited intake data for children aged 0–3, which is not comprehensive or ongoing.

National Context:

- The national Lead-K organization has reached out to Nevada, encouraging participation in their efforts and offering to present or engage with the state.
- This presents an opportunity to reignite the conversation and push for compliance and collaboration.

Eric Wilcox motioned to draft a letter to the Nevada Department of Education requesting an update on their obligations under the Lead-K law and to inform them of national interest in Nevada's participation. David Kelsey seconded. Members voted and the motion carried.
