4. **For Information, Discussion, and Possible Action:** Discuss 2025 Engagement Conference Objective and Initiative and the CommUNITY impact over the last 2 years. Action to include a formal request for Planning Team Members to support the Executive Director in aiding planning and hosting this conference.

[ROUGH DRAFT] Conference Objective: This conference is a Deaf and Hard of Hearing (D/HH) Systems Navigation and Resource Development conference for stakeholders and Community Partners. This conference provides a safe space for gaining awareness of statewide resources, peer to peer resourcing, and legislative gains in the Deaf and/or Hard of Hearing CommUNITY. Expanding statewide awareness of Deaf and Hard of Hearing resources and systems navigation as a CommUNITY increases access, engagement, and advocacy statewide within our service provisions and legislative initiatives. These efforts highlight and bring recognition of recent legislative gains and the positive outcomes of CommUNITY focused advocacy through the Commission's ongoing efforts to fulfill the state plan of Access, Engagement, and Advocacy.

[ROUGH DRAFT] Initiative: The Nevada Commission for Person who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing or Speech Impaired is seeking to educate and empower individuals who are Deaf and/or Hard of Hearing on the state of Nevada's current resources and system navigation as it pertains to D/HH autonomy in the state of Nevada. This initiative is to promote D/HH communication access and support for the current gaps in knowledge and awareness of State, Non-Profit, and for-profit services and resources achieved through legislative gains. This initiative is to impact the legislative process for the 84th session in 2027 and aid in maintaining the momentum of CommUNITY engagement. As a CommUNITY, we must know what we have, to get where we want to be. **Maximizing legislative gains through D/HH CommUNITY resourcing.**

Obioma expressed appreciation to the Governor's Developmental Disabilities Council (DD Council) for their support over the past two years.

The DD Council has significantly helped the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Commission by:

Providing access to communication and legislative knowledge.

Empowering the community to engage with legislators confidently.

Offering educational programs that have had a ripple effect in the community. Conference Purpose and Objective

The upcoming event is a Deaf and Hard of Hearing System Navigation and Resource Development Conference.

Primary goals:

Create a safe space for awareness and access to statewide and peer-to-peer resources.

Promote legislative engagement and advocacy.

Expand awareness of system navigation and community relationships.

Align with the state plan for access, inclusion, and advocacy.

Initiative Behind the Conference

The initiative is driven by the Nevada Commission for Individuals who are Deaf, Hard of Hearing, and Speech Impaired.

It aims to:

- o Educate and empower individuals who are navigating Nevada's systems.
- o Promote communication, access, and advocacy.
- $\circ \;\;$ Address gaps in knowledge and services.
- Prepare for the 84th Legislative Session in 2027.
- o Strengthen community engagement and legislative readiness.

A planning team or subcommittee is needed to organize the conference.

Obioma Officer suggested a collaborative team (e.g., 3–4 members from their team and 2–3 from ADSD).

Emphasis is placed on shared responsibility and ensuring the subcommittee leads the planning process.

The engagement conference will feature four distinct tracks; each tailored to specific community needs:

Education, Students, Youth, and Families

Focused on supporting young individuals and their families in navigating education and related resources.

Track A:

Addressing the unique needs and challenges faced by older adults in the deaf and hard of hearing community and the DeafBlind Community

A dedicated track for individuals who are both deaf and blind, ensuring inclusive access and support. There will be a focus on deaf and blind resources and advocacy. There will be contact with the Helen Keller Institute as well as the Nevada Dual Sensory Impairment Project.

Track B:

Concentrated on advocacy, legislative processes, building rapport with legislators. and policy development relevant to the community. Allyship will be focused on.

Track C:

This will focus on senior citizen resources, advocacy, accessibility, care, Adult Protective Services, age abuse, prevention, insurance communication, Deaf Seniors of America (their president will be invited to present on this subject), and accessibility.

Track D:

This track will be about youth resources and advocacy such as Nevada Hands and Voices, Nevada Early Intervention Services (NEIS), 504 Plans, Vocational Rehabilitation workforce services, deaf school resources, DHH curriculum, and communication accessibility for K12 and beyond.

These tracks are not yet fully detailed in the current objective statement but there are plans to revise and include them in an updated draft.

With three months to go before the Engagement Conference (December 13th and 14th with the location still to be determined.), the registration information will be sent out soon.

The following people volunteered to be on the planning team with Obioma Officer: Beth Jones, Shelly Freed, Eli Schwartz, C.J. Johnson, members of the ADA team, and Catherine Nielsen.

This conference will be partnered with the Las Vegas Deaf Seniors and Lee Bullock will be there, representing them.

 - a) Outcomes/Gains on Deaf/Hard of Hearing (D/HH) Related Bills:

• <u>AB247 Overview</u> – **Died.** (No further action taken.)

Eli Schwartz explained this bill was combined with other bills and had a fiscal note attached.

AB367 Overview – Passed. 1. This section and sections 41, 42 and 43 of this act become effective upon passage and approval.
 Sections 1 to 40, inclusive, of this act become effective: (a) Upon passage and approval for the purpose of adopting any regulations and performing any other preparatory administrative tasks that are necessary to carry out the provisions of this act; and (b) On January 1, 2026, for all other purposes.

Having ASL in the election booth through the electronic devices and pre-recorded signs for each of the ballots to review.

AB368 Overview – Passed. 1. This section becomes effective upon passage and approval. 2. Sections 1 to 36, inclusive, of this act become effective: (a) Upon passage and approval for the purpose of adopting any regulations and performing any other preparatory administrative tasks that are necessary to carry out the provisions of this act; and (b) On or before October 1, 2025, for all other purposes.

Use of Electronic Devices for Communication

Nevada law now allows individuals, including those who are deaf or have physical disabilities, to use electronic devices for communication access without restrictions.

This ensures equal access and removes barriers for those who rely on technology to communicate.

Assembly Bill (AB) 368 - Monitoring Devices in Facilities

Purpose: To protect individuals in care facilities from abuse and neglect.

Key Provisions:

Individuals have the right to install monitoring devices (e.g., cameras) in private spaces like bedrooms, not just common areas.

The individual decides whether to install a device, giving them control over their own safety and privacy.

These devices can help:

Document abuse or neglect that may occur in private settings.

Protect staff and facilities from false accusations.

Provide evidence in cases involving non-verbal individuals or those unable to report incidents.

Additional Notes

Flyers have been created to explain the bill's key points, including:

Who must comply.

Consequences for non-compliance.

Why the law matters.

There is a need for clarification on whether communication devices are also covered under AB 368, as the bill currently focuses on monitoring devices.

• <u>AB395 Overview</u> – **Died.** (No further action taken.)

Access for deaf and hard of hearing patients in a medical and health care facility.

That was about nursing homes, physical therapy, occupational therapy, having access to sign language interpreters and all the stated the facilities in that building because of.

Web platform cost it would have been \$200,000.

The fiscal note that was attached to that bill is what caused it to die. Las Vegas Deaf Seniors will try for this again in the next legislative session.

• <u>SB78 Overview</u> – **Died.** (No further action taken.)

This proposed to remove the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Commission.

• <u>SB188 Overview</u> – **Passed.** Effective October 1, 2025.

This dealt with access to communication for deaf and hard of hearing individuals and for Spanish speaking patients in hospitals.

• <u>SB192 Overview</u> – **Died.** (No further action taken.)

There are different birthing centers, hospitals, homes, birthing centers that are required to have a live sign language interpreter,

somebody there in person, or they're deaf and hard of hearing patients. The Commission will work on having a Bill Draft Request for the next legislative session.

• <u>SB352 Overview</u> – **Vetoed by the Governor.** (Return to 84th Session)

This had to do with discrimination by insurance companies. This will be brought back to the legislature for the next session.

<u>SB400 Overview</u> – **Passed.** Section 3 effective June 9, 2025.
 Section 1 effective July 1, 2025. Section 2 effective July 1, 2026.

This bill had an error in its language and is being addressed by the Commission.
